Why Academic Skills? A Call to Action!

- Recent study at four Ontario universities, surveyed 2,230 students
- More than half the students felt they lacked competence in basic academic skills (writing, test taking, analysis, time and group management, research, presentation and numeracy skills)
- 41% of students could be classified as at risk in academic settings because of limited levels of basic skills
- 16% lacked almost all of the skills needed for higher learning.

Active > **SLS** = **Library**









SLS

As with any organization, the success of a merged IT and library lies with the people involved. The structure itself is not going to create space for collaboration. It takes clear, effective, and courageous leadership, providing flexibility for people to do their best work together. Merging IT and libraries is not a catchall answer to solve any number of individual issues facing both of these professional communities, but it does open communication for how each group wishes to consider their future, which will most likely be together rather than separately.
